



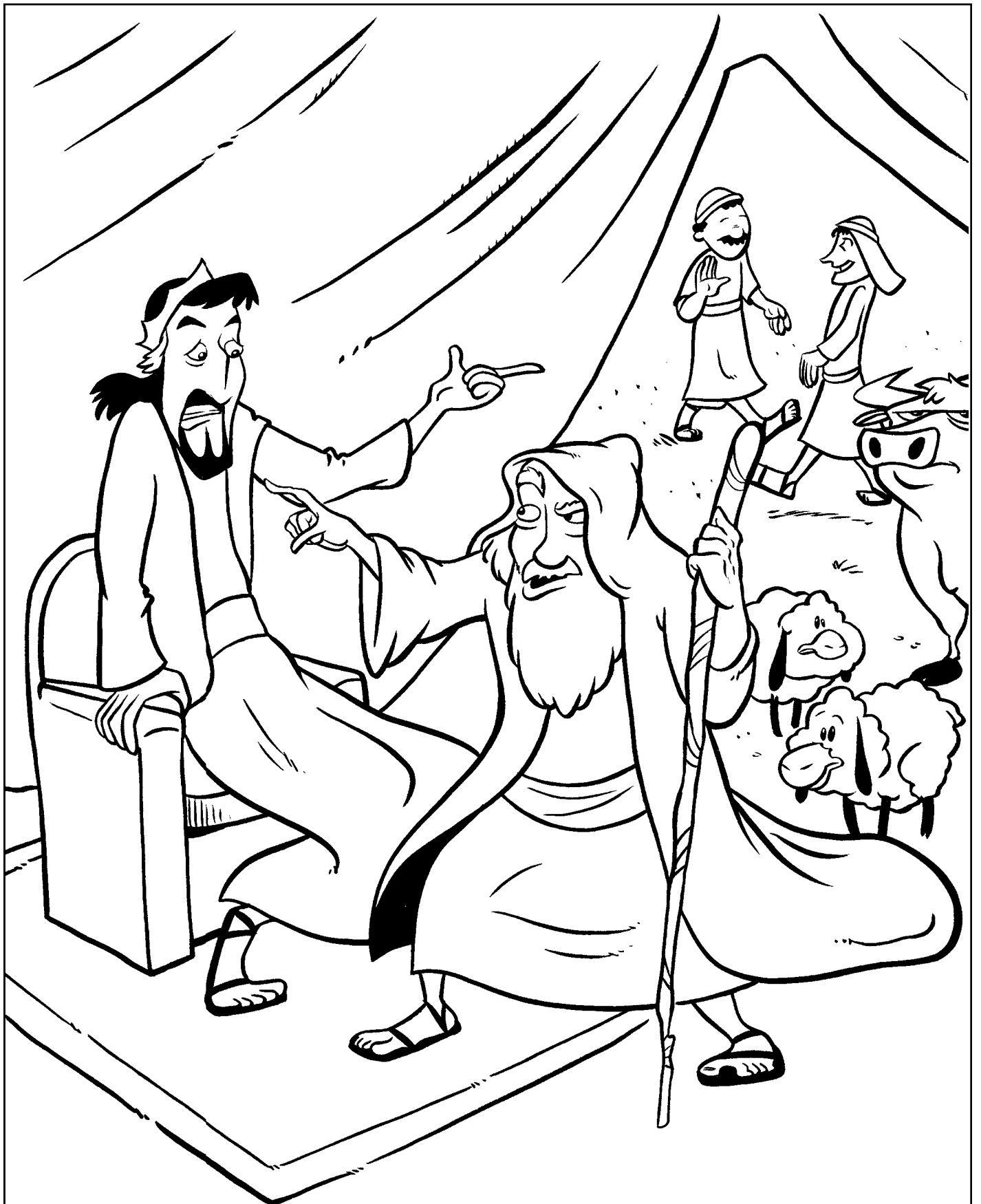
**“Then Samuel took a flask of oil and poured it on his head, and kissed him and said:

(1 Samuel 10:1).**



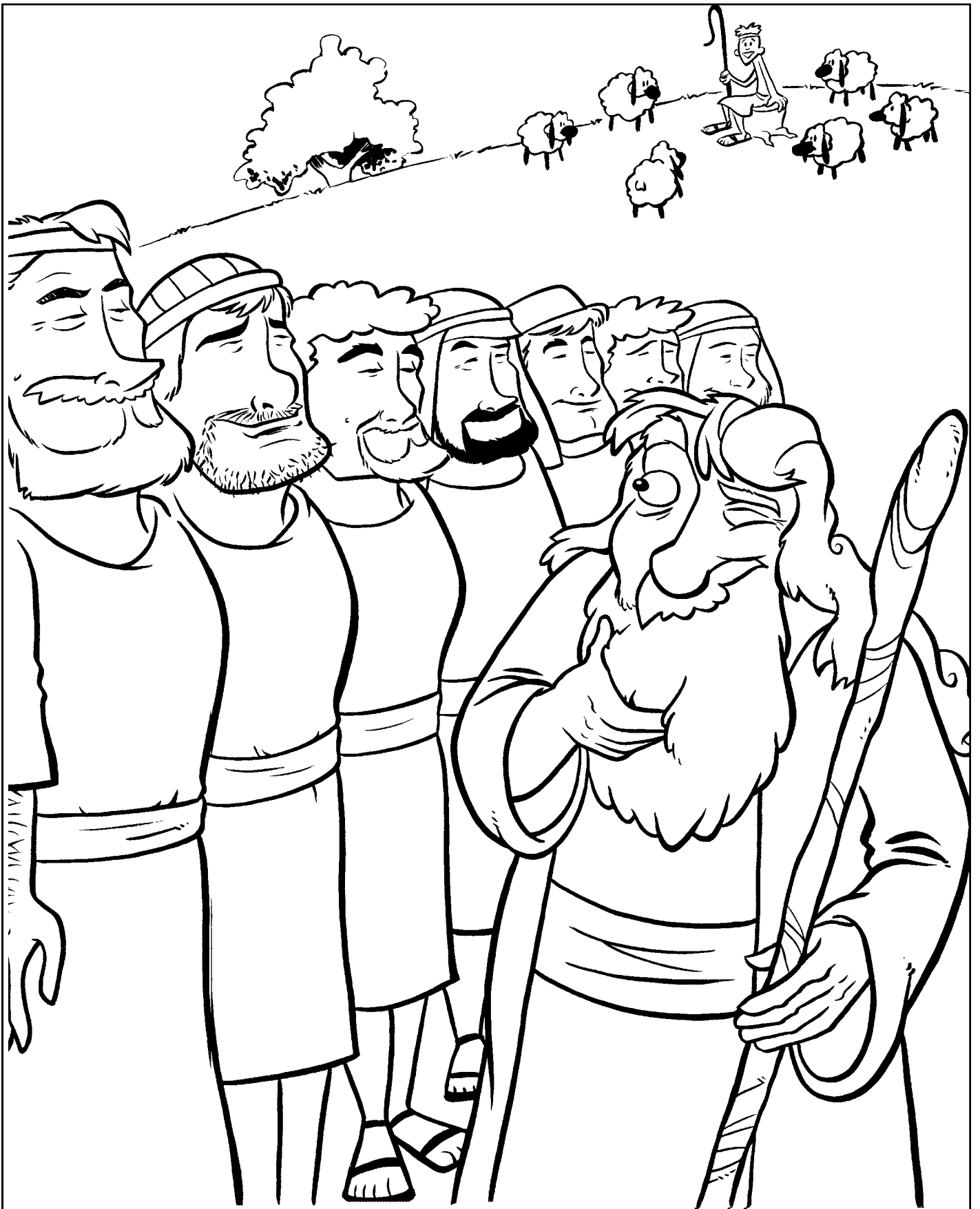

And he offered the burnt offering” (1 Samuel 13:9).**



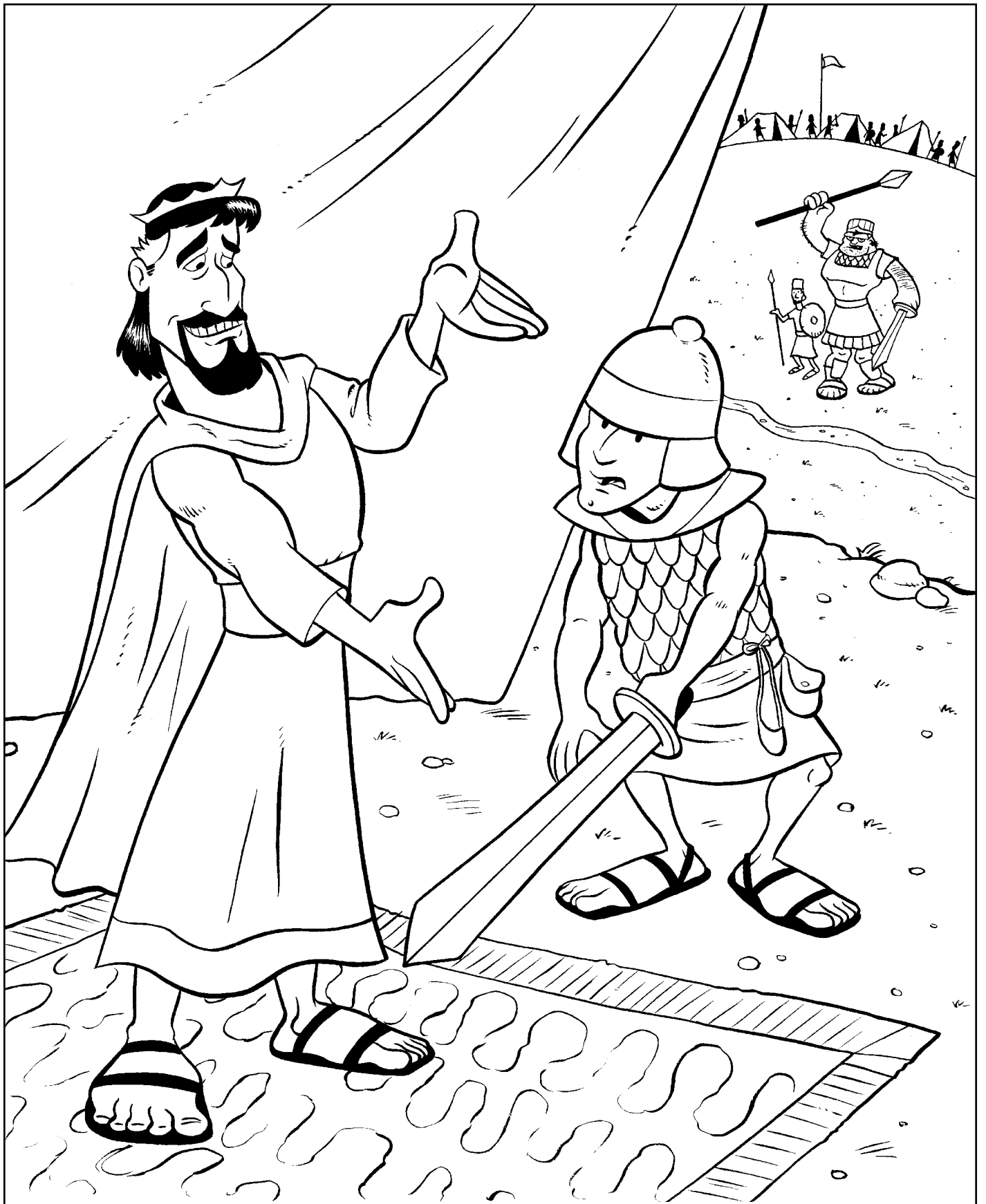

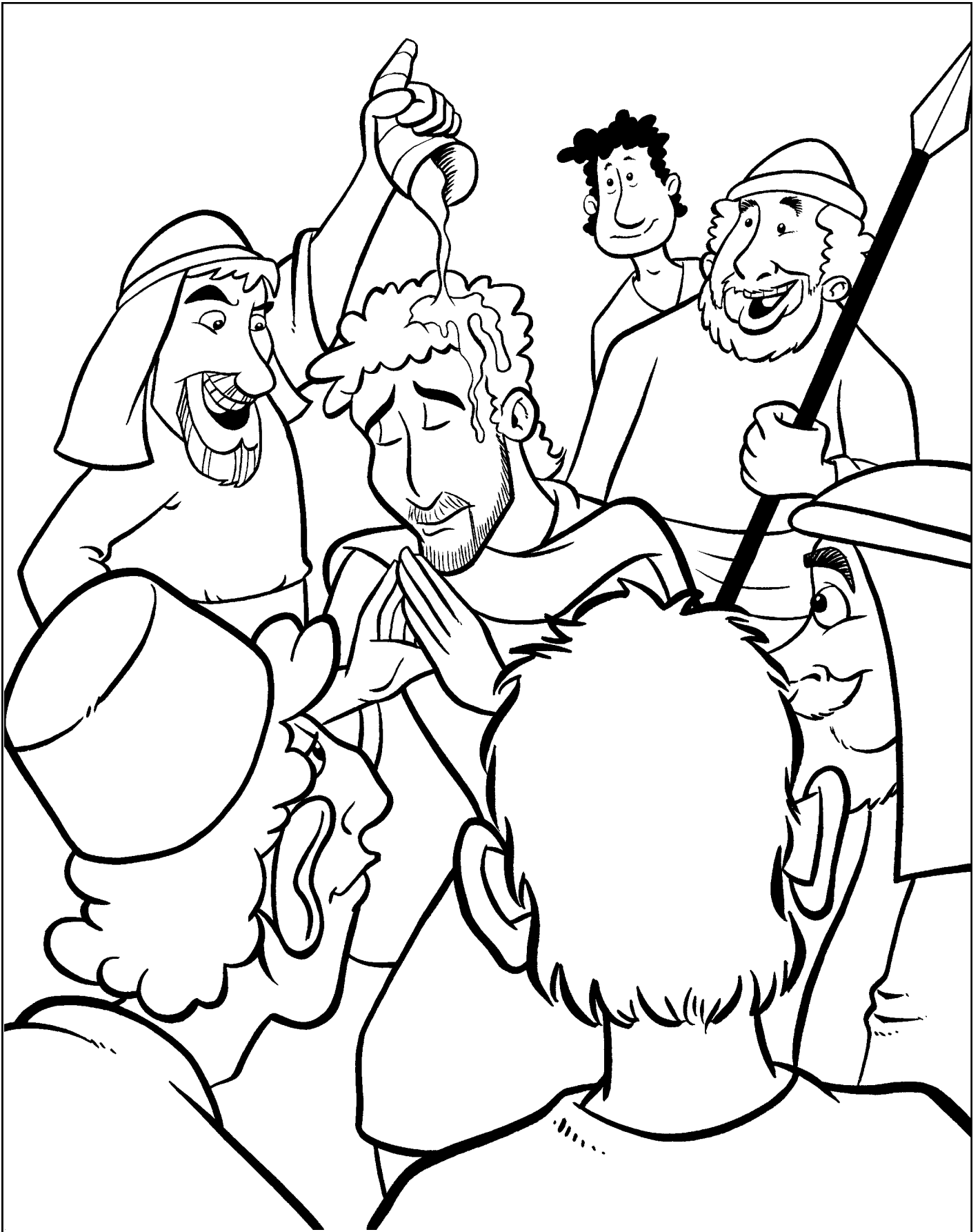

**David expressed great sorrow when he heard that Jonathan and Saul were dead (2 Sam. 2:1–15).**



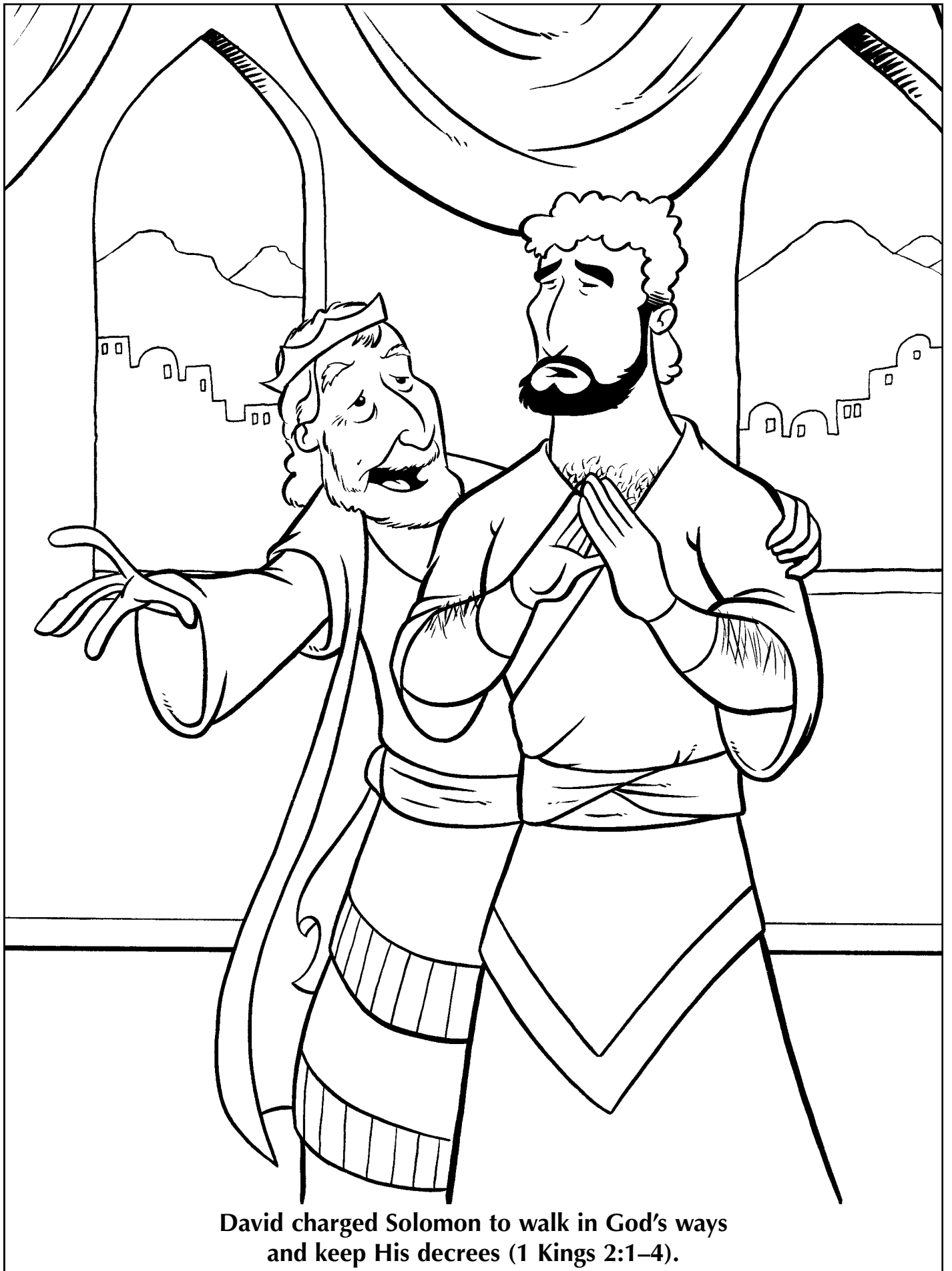
**“Then the men of Judah came, and there they anointed David king over the house of Judah” (2 Samuel 2:4a).**

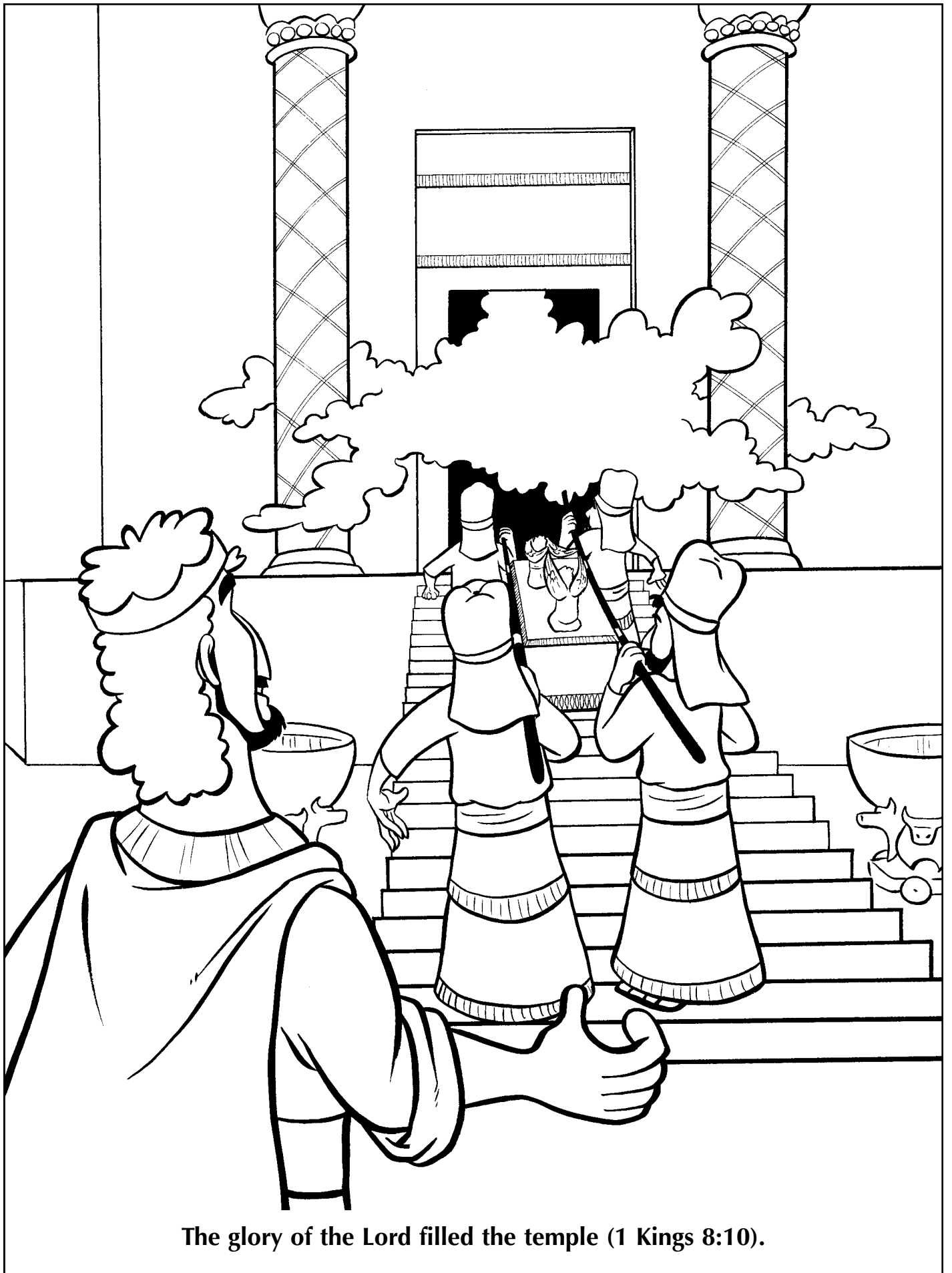
**“Then King David went in and sat before the LORD; and he said...‘For Your word’s sake, and according to Your own heart, You have done all these great things’”

**Ahijah the prophet told Jeroboam's wife that Jeroboam's son Abijah would die (1 Kings 14:6-16).**



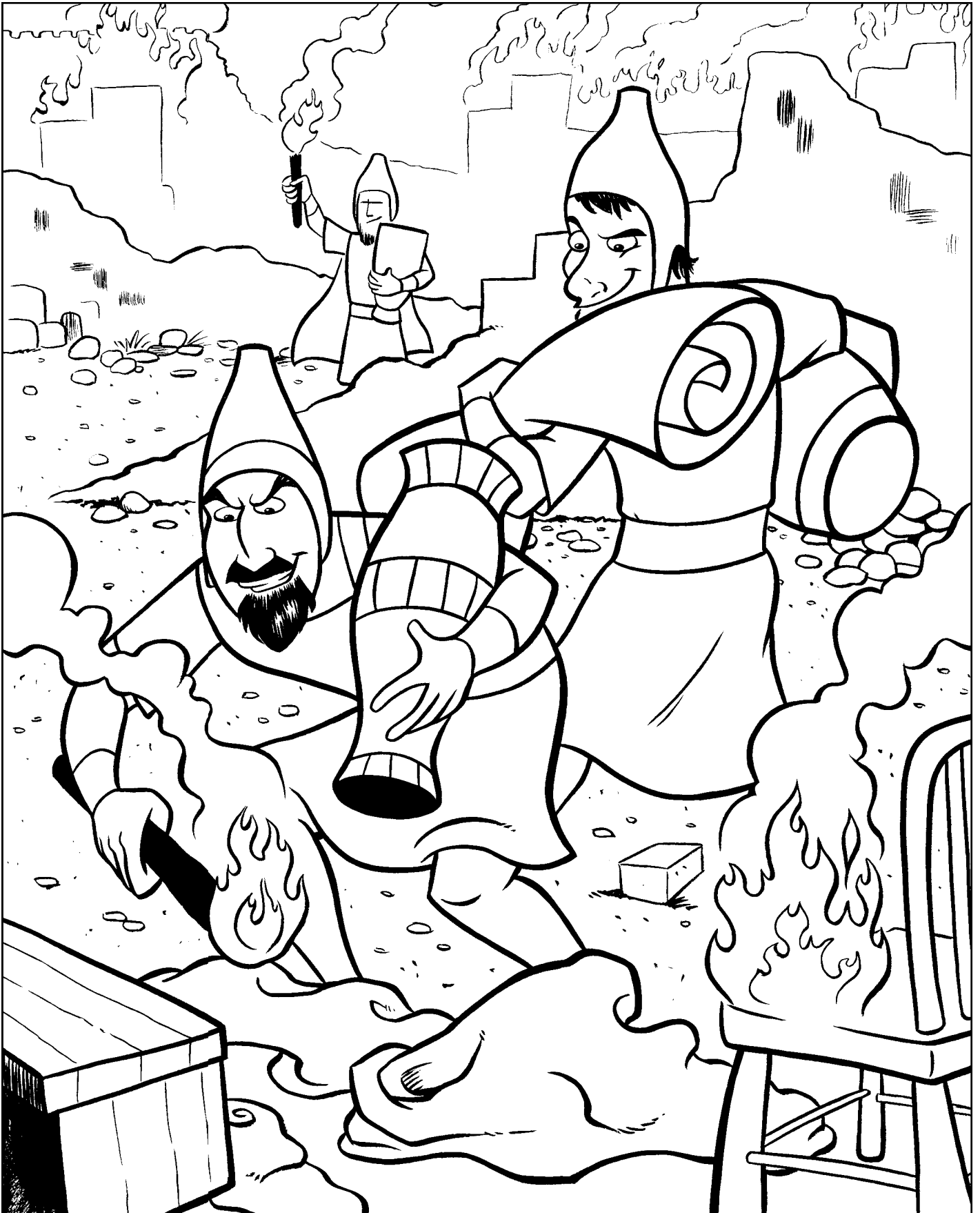
**"As the LORD God of Israel lives, before whom I stand, there shall not be dew nor rain these years, except at my word" (1 Kings 17:1b).**

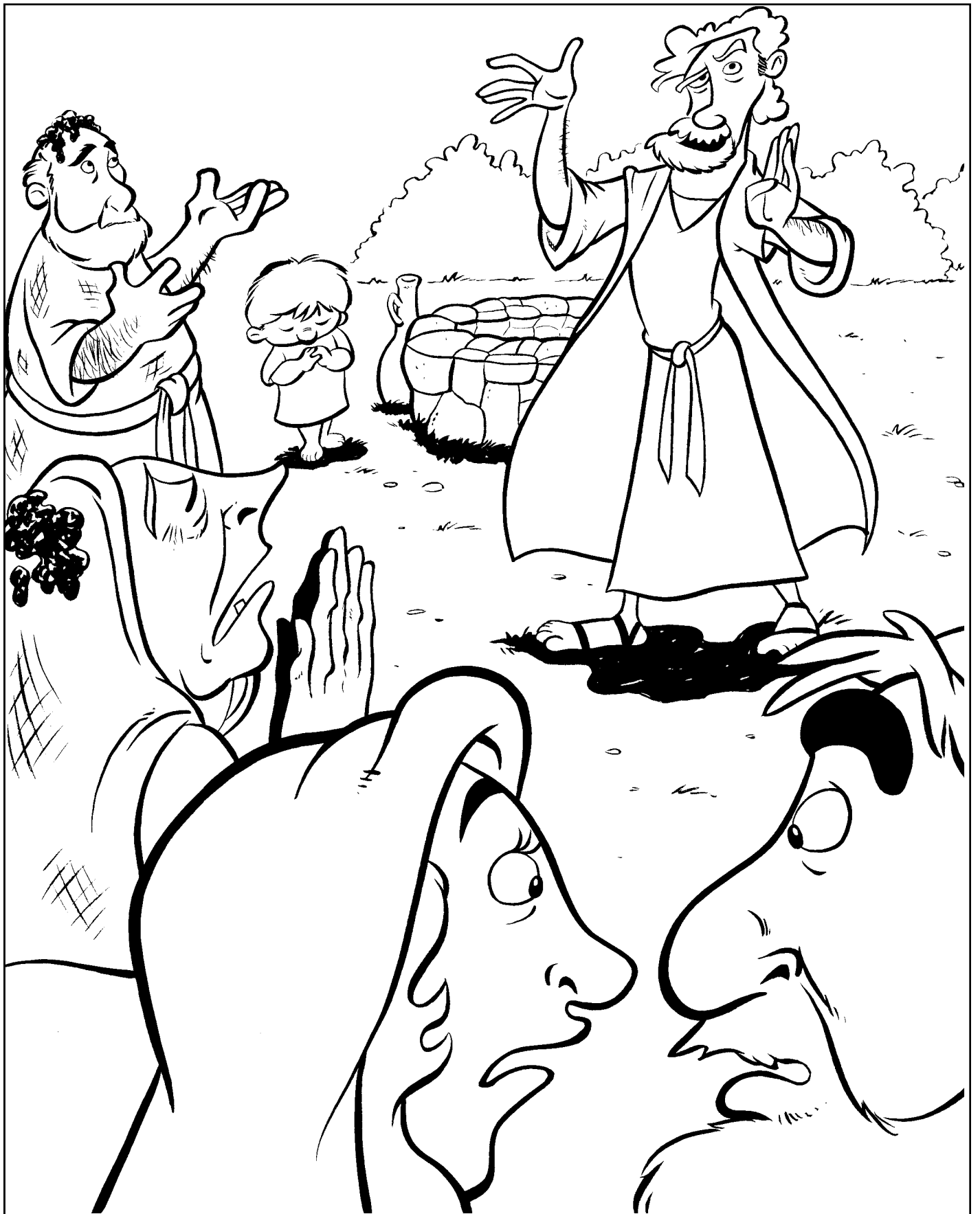


Judah forsook the Lord and worshiped false gods (2 Kings 21).

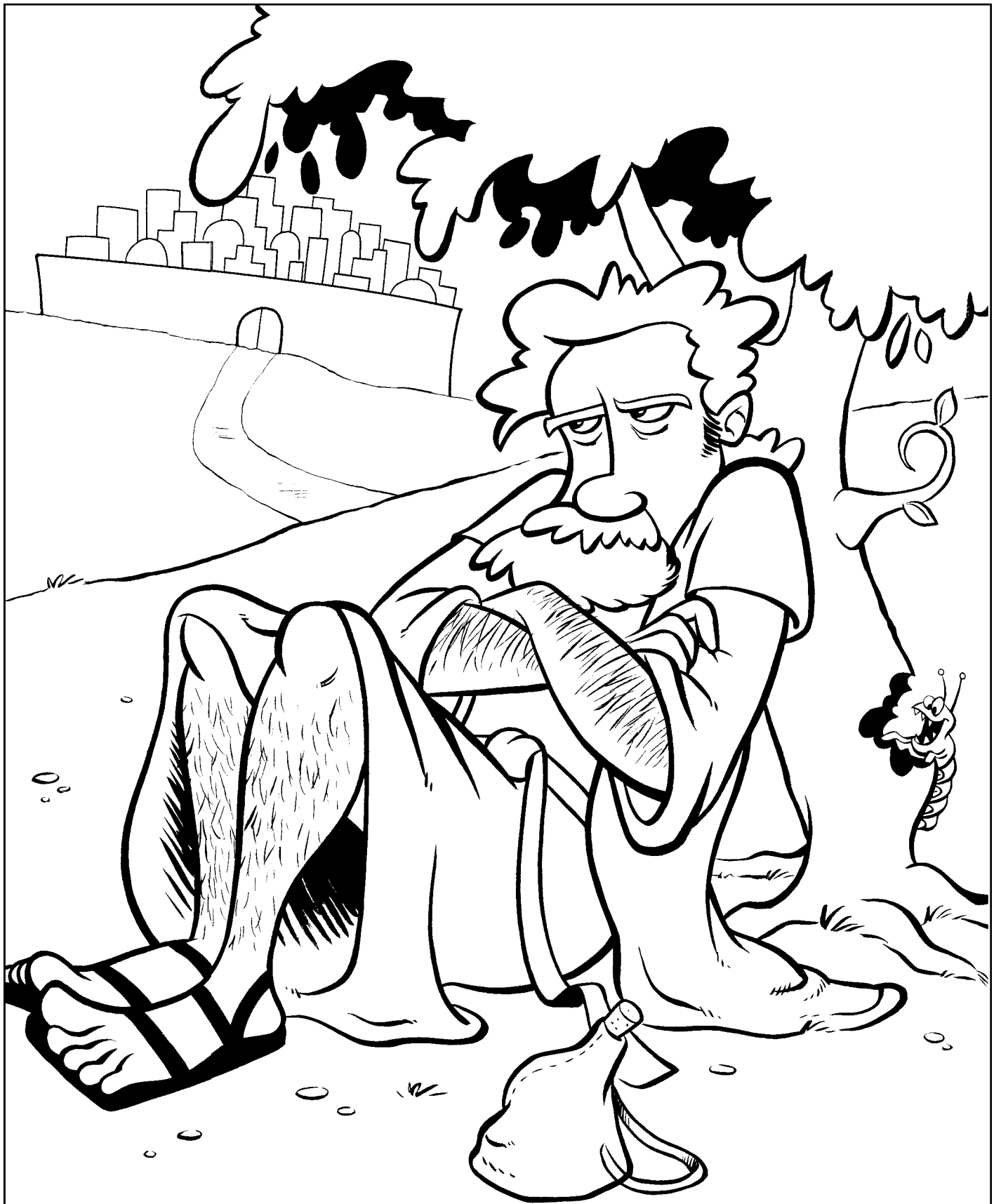

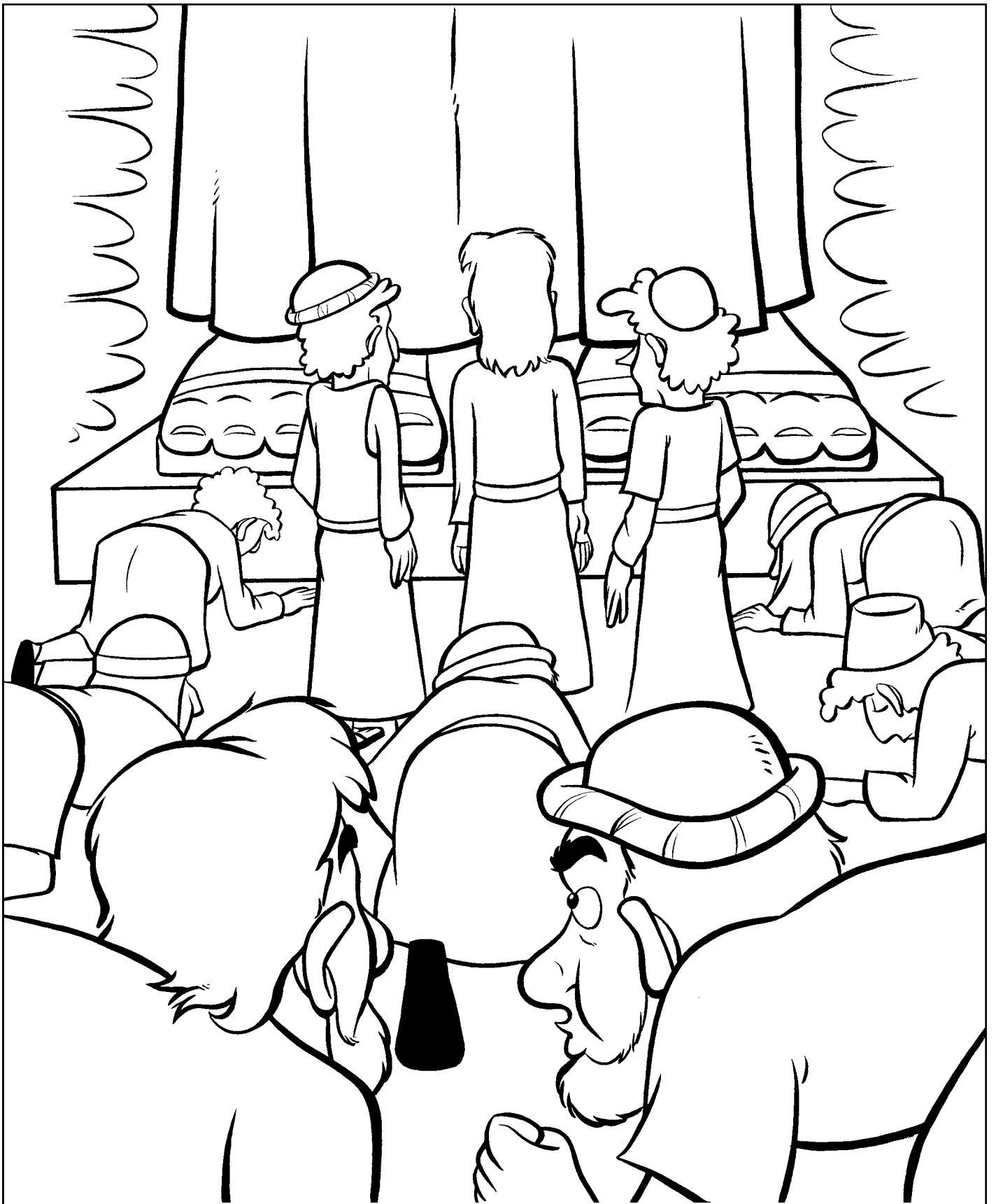

Jonah was angry that Nineveh repented and that God had mercy on them. He said, "I know that You are a gracious and merciful God, slow to anger and abundant in lovingkindness." Then the Lord said, "Is it right for you to be angry?" (Jonah 4:2, 4).



**“There are certain Jews whom you have set over the affairs of the province of Babylon: Shadrach, Meshach, and Abed-Nego; these men, O king, have not paid due regard to you. They do not serve your gods or worship the gold image which you have set up” (Daniel 3:12).**

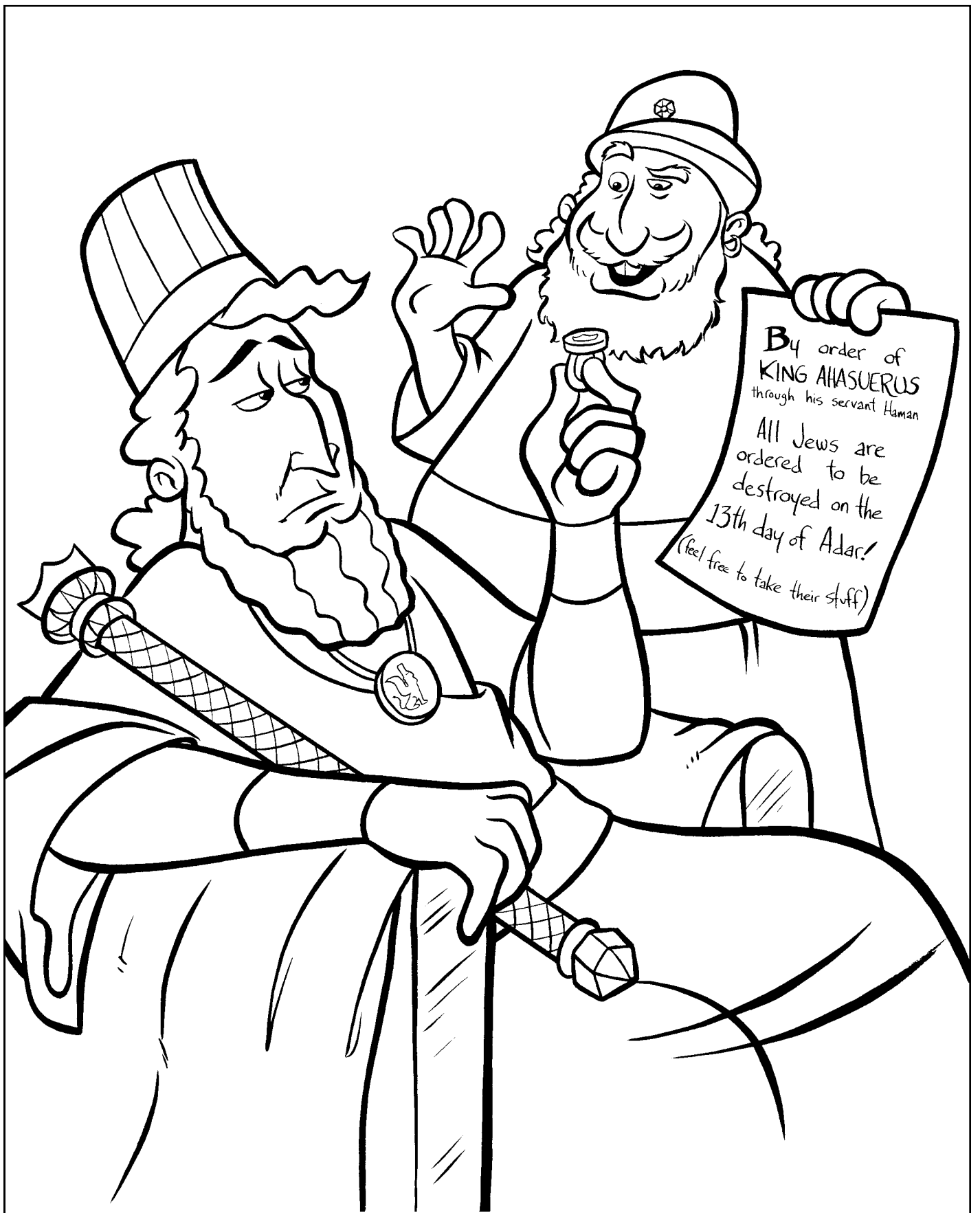

**“The king loved Esther more than all the other women,...so he set the royal crown upon her head and made her queen instead of Vashti” (Esther 2:17).**

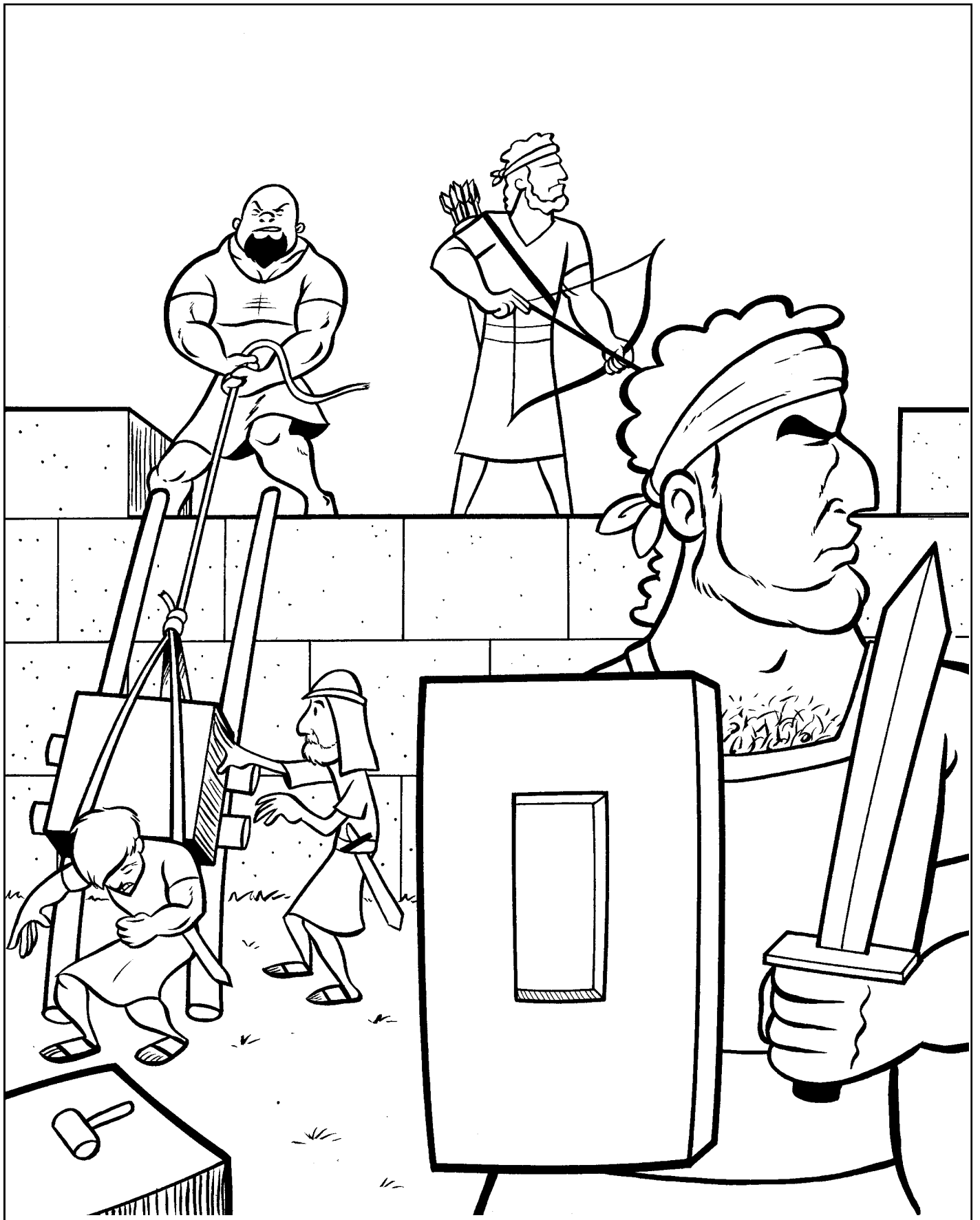


**Haman conspired to kill the Jews by urging King Ahasuerus to write a decree stating that all Jews should be destroyed (Esther 3:8–11).**





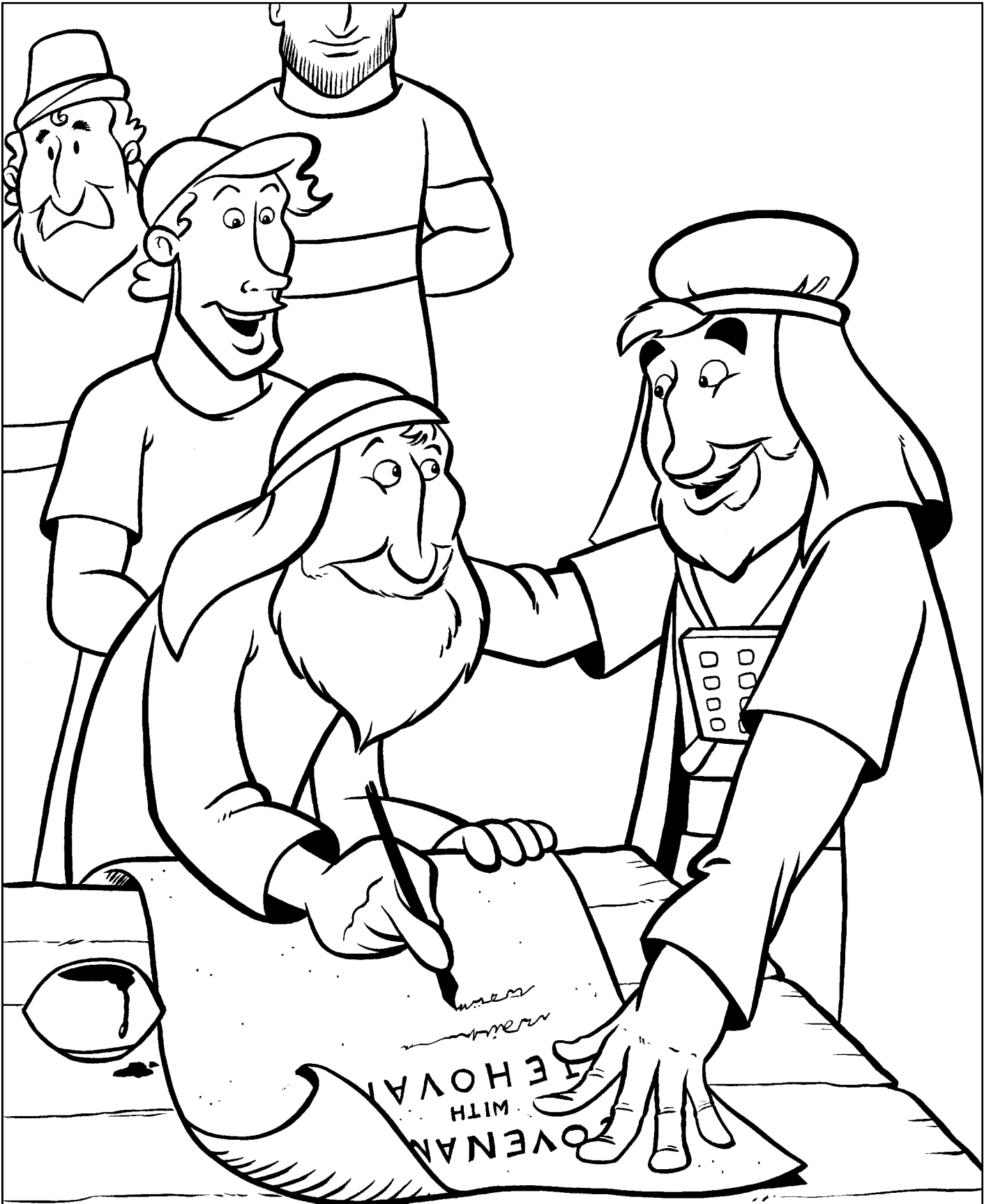
Nehemiah asked the king for permission to rebuild Jerusalem's wall (Neh. 2:5).
